





Project Timeline







Progress against IRCF 4 Strategic Priorities

What barriers might there be to these projects and who could help?


- Funding (3)

People see results of grants and think that their organisation could also apply for similar, so they can improve and grow. Other projects are being initiated on the back of other successful projects i.e., solar at the Community Centre has led to solar at the Senior Citizens.

Partnerships and amalgamations are happening.



(From those who see Junee as at Growth) – there are public space renovations happening across Junee, groups are helping each other, other organisations are getting ready to apply for grants for the first time. There is innovation happening.

Issues: How do we get more volunteers for our associations to maintain this energy? Lack of involvement from youth, people in general and the media.



External Stakeholders

From the six external stakeholders who participated at the Junee breakfast, there was a good familiarity and understanding of the services/events delivered by the organisations. There was recognition that every group could benefit from more volunteers. Some organisations rely on one or two key people, who are central to the organisation's activity and growth. Broadening the membership of organisations was seen as essential to reduce this key person risk. It was pointed out that every organisation in the program brings the town together in what they did.
